Rescue, Rehab and What Comes Next: Saving Sea Turtles at the New England Aquarium

Ever wonder what happens when a sea turtle washes up on shore in New England, or how hundreds of sea turtles are cared for during



mass casualty stranding events? Since 1968 the New England Aquarium has helped thousands of sea turtles here at the Aquarium and during other emergency events around the USA. Sea turtles found sick or injured in Coastal Massachusetts become patients in our Sea Turtle Hospital and receive veterinary care until they regain optimal health and are strong enough to return to their natural habitat.

This evening's lecture will highlight turtle rescues and the medical management of sea turtles, ranging from giant leatherbacks to emergency care during large scale events involving hundreds of sick or injured turtles.

Living Fossil and Blue Blood: The Story of the Horseshoe Crab and Human Health

The American horseshoe crab, Limulus polyphemus, is an ancient marine arthropod with a

lineage that goes back 440 million years. It is an important species for both its pivotal place in the ecosystem and for its valuable use in everyday human health. Biomedical manufacturers and conservationists alike have a vested interest in making sure this species continues to thrive and flourish.



As stewards of the environment, we

have a responsibility to preserve, protect and strive to achieve balance between our need for this animal's valuable blood and the livelihood of the animal that provides it.

In this presentation, we'll discuss how these animals experience challenges in and out of their natural habitat; we will also review the significance of their remarkable blue blood to human health and the innovative technology that further safeguards this species and assures the sustainability of this important resource.

Celebrate National Lighthouse Day at the re-lighting of the Nantucket Lightship beacon August 7 - 8

August 7 & 8 - The Nantucket/LV-112, a former commissioned U.S. Coast Guard floating lighthouse (1936-75), National Historic Landmark and National Treasure will be celebrating the restoration of its historic 500,000 candlepower lightbeacon and fog horn at its homeport berth in Boston Harbor. At dusk, on August 7th, Nantucket/LV-112's once bright and guiding lightbeacon will be turned on once again and activate its bellowing fog horn, for the first time since it was decommissioned in Boston and extinguished in 1975.

The celebration will be on the waterfront pier, adjacent to Nantucket/LV-112, at the Boston Harbor Shipyard and Marina (http://www.bhsmarina.com) in historic East Boston. Also, there will be oceanographic and maritime history displays that will include notable historic lighthouse exhibits, period U.S. Lifesaving Service lifesaving demonstrations, shipwreck artifacts, maritime art and antiques, historic New England pirate artifacts, activities for children, fresh and prepared local seafood, beverages and live music. This will surely be a day for everyone to enjoy, celebrate and have fun learning about our nation's maritime heritage and contemporary nautical and oceanographic sciences.

The Maritime Festival will also present an opportunity to create additional awareness with the general public about your museum, organization or company's services, products, demonstrations and exhibits. In addition, our event will be well suited for special interest maritime organizations that want to gain more exposure with the general public. Our target audience is anyone interested in maritime history and anyone who likes to experience the gifts and lure of the sea.

Boaters Find Newest Portable Outboard Fuel Tanks Not All They're Cracked Up to Be: Installing Fuel-Demand Valve Wise Move BoatUS Video Shows You How

ALEXANDRIA, Va., June 30, 2015 - Owners with outboard powered boats have lived with portable fuel tanks for years, but recent well-intentioned efforts to stop smog-causing gas fumes from escaping by eliminating the familiar two-way vent is causing new concerns. Without a vent - typically a small screw type fixture on the tank's cap or top - a portable tank can swell up like a balloon in the hot sun with the internal pressure forcing gas into the outboard where it can spew inside the cowling, eventually dribbling out. It's a wise move to install an inexpensive fuel-demand valve in the fuel line that will prevent any gas from reaching the motor unless the motor calls for it, and BoatUS has a video and easy to follow instructions to show you how.

"Our members are telling us that the new tanks aren't all they are cracked up to be," said BoatUS Magazine Executive Editor Mike Vatalaro. "These new EPA compliant portable tanks and jerry jugs have special fittings that greatly reduce evaporative emissions from gasoline. But where traditional tanks simply vent to the atmosphere, the new tanks won't vent until the internal pressure reaches five pounds per square inch. In the meantime, fuel could be forced up the fuel line into the outboard, many of which have no means to hold it back."

"Leaving the tank disconnected just results in the same gush of gas once you do hook it up, either from the tank end or through the engine," added Vatalaro. "Installing an inexpensive fuel-demand valve in the fuel line will prevent any gas from reaching the motor unless the motor calls for it." The video and instructions can be found at:
