# Harbor Island Cleanup

The time has come for the islands to clean up and put on their spring look! Everyone is welcome to help with the Spring Clean up of the islands on Saturday, April 18, 1987. We will meet at Bay State Cruises, Long Wharf at 10:00 AM for the boat to Gallops and Lovells, and at Mass Bay Lines, Hingham at 10:00 AM for the boat to Grape and Bumpkin. You will be returning to the mainland by 4:00 PM.

Wear your cleaning clothes. Gloves and trash bags will be provided. Remember to bring lunch, beverage, and water. Warm sunny days on the harbor mean you should also find your sunscreen and lip balm.

The boats are FREE, no reservations are necessary, so come and join us as we clean up the islands for the 1987 season.



Land Day - 1987

Tuesday, April 28 there will be a Rally for the Environment at the State House in Boston. The purpose of this event is to demonstrate public support for protection of open space, agricultural land, state and local parks, urban parks, beaches, endangered species habitat, aquifer land, and river fronts. The days events include: 10 AM - Tour of the State House, 11AM - Introduction to the Legislative Process, 12 noon - the EVENT - program with refreshments. Beginning at 1 PM the afternoon is available for visits with legislators (set up meetings in advance). For more information call the Mass. Would you like a different volunteer opportunity? Organized by the Alliance for Boston Harbor Action the Boston Harbor Monitoring Frogram is a cooperative effort of citizens and nonprofit organizations whose purpose is to find solutions to the pollution problems plaguing Boston Harbor. This pilot monitoring program combines the efforts of the Boston Harbor Associates, FRIENDS OF THE BOSTON HARBOR ISLANDS, New England Aquarium, Save the Harbor-Save the Bay, Massachusetts Bay Marine Studies Consortium, Massachusetts Audubon Society, and Northeastern University.

Monitoring is done on a weekly, two hour basis by groups of two or three citizen volunteers under the direction of a trained team leader. There are five onand offshore test sites in the Boston, Quincy, and Dorchester Bay areas, where volunteers actively collect scientific data on the harbor's water quality. This data serves as a baseline for scientists to measure the progress being made, or not being made, by those involved in the harbor cleanup.

The volunteers have been very enthusiastic, and represent neighborhoods across Boston and the South Shore. They are all ages and bring varied educational backgrounds to the monitoring sessions. All volunteers have received hands on experience as part of their training. Data sheets are kept with the scientific information and individual comments from those who participated on weather conditions and any relevant data.

What next? Nahant volunteers will begin testing in Broad Sound shortly upon completion of their training. In July the Boston Harbor Monitoring program will be expanding to Deer Island Flats. Three members of the Friends, Mary Lunsford, Pat Embree, and Sue Smith, are participating. Interested members of the Friends are welcome and should call the Mass. Audubon Society office at 367-1026, to find out how to be a volunteer in the Monitoring Program.

Remember the polluted harbor water washes the shores of our islands twice every day. Help with the Citizens Monitoring Program so that by the year 2000 we can tell visitors: "Yes, you can swim in Boston Harbor".

This spring, the Friends of the Boston Harbor Islands, Inc., in association with Applewood Books, Inc., will reprint THE KING'S HANDBOOK OF BOSTON HARBOR by M.F. Sweetser. This classic history of Boston Harbor originally was published in 1882. A second edition was published in 1883, and the third edition, which we will reprint, was published in 1888.

Moses Foster Sweetser (1848-1897) was the author of 19 guidebooks about New England as well as several other literary, artistic and historical works. THE KING'S HANDBOOK OF BOSTON HARBOR describes all of the islands and the harbor environs from Hull to Nantasket to Dorchester and points eastward. In 11 chapters (302 pages) the reader is introduced to places and points of interest all around the harbor, including each of the harbor islands and such communities as Quincy, East Boston, and Winthrop. Sweetser's account is interspersed with fascinating historical facts and numerous illustrations, (Imagine traveling around the islands by steamboat for only ten cents!).

THE KING'S HANDBOOK OF BOSTON HARBOR is a wonderful guide to the Boston Harbor Islands as they were 100 years ago. The book reaffirms that the islands, as we know them today, have been a unique natural and recreational resource for thousands of visitors for well over a century.

The Friends are delighted to be reissuing this guidebook. We hope that you will want to add it to your collection of books on the Boston Harbor Islands. The reprint edition will be published in softcover at a price of \$9.95 (Members will receive a 20% discount). It will be on sale at Friend's events and at local bookstores.

# Camp Stove

How would you like to have a camp stove that is cheap, simple and very useful? It's a charcoal stove that you can make from an old "tin can".

The typcial charcoal hibachi is useful for grilling, toasting, etc., but doesn't provide enough concentration of heat to boil water and it is usually bulky and heavy.

This light weight "tin can" stove can induce a higher intensity of heat to provide for greater cooking diversity and it is easy to make.

Start with a large food or beverage can, preferably one gallon size, the larger the better, or use a piece of stovepipe about one foot long. Cut out both ends, or at least the top end, of the can. About midheight of the can drill or punch holes through both sides in two sets of holes at right angles to each other.


Drill, punch, or cut a series of holes, about 1/2 inch in size around the can, close to the top and also close to the bottom. These are air circulation holes. Trim or flatten all protruding sharp edges.


Cut off pieces of clothes hanger wire and push a piece through each set of holes around the middle; leave enough wire protruding at each side to bend down to hold in place.

Cut out a piece of heavy screening and place it inside on the criss-cross wires to

hold the charcoal up.

Charcoal loaded into the top may be ignited by burning loosely packed tinder in the bottom or with lighter fluid. your lighted stove on rocks or dirt so as not to burn the grass, table, etc.





#### Happenings at Hewitts

On Saturday, March 28, nine members of the Board of Directors and the Volunteer Committee visited the Friend's Hewitts Cove site and discussed the possibilities that a South Shore base has to offer. Located in a building next to DEM headquarters, the 2nd floor space will be divided between the Friends and Mass. Bay Lines. The Friends began the process of acquiring use of the space in 1985, and now have a five year Special Use Permit. We even have our logo on the door!

Right now, the space needs a lot of work. In addition to cleanup - the space is full of old furniture, (usable) shelves and partitions, promotional material and cooking equipment from the Mass. Seafood Council, and ample evidence of visiting pigeons -- the space needs a new roof, new windows, new wiring, and probably a new On the brighter side, Brian floor. Shanahan, (DEM) Park Supervisor, told us that the DEM has money for a new roof and will be putting it on in late spring. It was suggested that building supply companies could be approached for donations of materials for repairs.

In discussing the issue, the Friends

agreed that the growth potential for Hewitts Cove and the value of a location there far outweighted the site's present dalapidated state. Bill Beebe will head a task force that will plan and implement development of the space. George O'Brien will be project manager for Hewitt's Cove. His immediate concern is to seal the windows and clean out the space.

The June issue of <u>Tidings</u> will have more information on Hewitts Cove. Anyone attending the South Shore Open House on May 3 (2-4 PM) will have a chance to see the site for themselves...and maybe pick up one of the Mass. Seafood Council's (weatherbeaten) brochures on how to prepare a pollock or golden fried squid rings.
